In order to be scored, you must present this bonus listing / fuel log. You are free to tear apart and remove any pages that are not needed (for example, if you decide to skip all of the bonuses on page 9, you may remove that page). However, if you lose a page from the bonus listing, you may not claim any bonuses on that page. If you lose a bonus/fuel log page there is also a 100 point penalty to obtain a replacement.

IMPORTANT CAUTION: The following bonus locations are like a restaurant menu. If you order everything on the menu and eat it, you are going to get sick and perhaps die. Please pick and choose bonus destinations carefully!

NOTE: All times are local, Central Standard Time, unless otherwise specified.

REMEMBER: *Unless otherwise specified, the rider's head is required in all photos.*

When you are out there bonus hunting, *remember*, the bonus is not bagged until you complete the paperwork!

Checkpoint Information: The next checkpoint is the same as the end location.

The end checkpoint is open Saturday, November 26TH, 2011 from 1330-1400. Rally staff will be available for early check-in from 1300 onward.

Time penalty begin at 14:00:00. After 14:00:00 there will be a 10 points per minute penalty for being late. "Minutes" will be rounded up at one second past the key time. For example, 14:00:01 (one second past 2:00 pm.) will be counted as 1 minute late. Any rider who arrives after 15:10:00 *will not be considered a finisher of the rally.*

Mileage Caps:

The Rally | Pops66 2011 has both minimum and maximum mileage caps to be considered a finisher. The minimum mileage is 350 miles in the 8hr period. The maximum mileage is 475 miles. If you are over or under, you will DNF the rally. Also, riders will be scored via points per miles and outright points. Remember, efficiency takes president over outright miles.

Atoka County Oklahoma is a mix of rolling hills, native grass prairie and pine and hardwood forest fed by mountain streams, rivers and beautiful lakes. Settled by Choctaw Indians during the 1830 government removal, the county and county seat were named for a respected Choctaw, Captain Atoka, who led a band of his people to Indian Territory during the "Trail of Tears." The most prominent settlement during those early years was old Boggy Depot. It was a thriving trading post and supply depot during the Civil War, in the heart of Choctaw-Chickasaw land. Choctaw Gov. Allen Wright, a prominent Boggy Depot resident, suggested "Oklahoma" as the name of our state.

A center block is inscribed with a quote from Winston Churchill, and the reverse is listed the names of those who were prisoners during the various wars. From the elongated base rise are four marble columns which are sliced off at an angle to designate a life cut short. These slender columns honor those who gave their lives.

The Chisholm Trail is responsible for allowing the transportation of cattle from Texas to the rail lines to the north, getting beef to markets in the east. The main branch continued north through this location to the Canadian River where it crossed on its way to Abilene. A western branch developed going to the Cheyenne Indian Agency at Darlington near Ft. Reno. This branch ran northwest for about 20 miles where it intersected the Fort Sill – Arkansas City Military Road. There, the herds turned north for the 15 miles trip to the agency. This detour enabled the drovers to sell to the agency, as well as to reposition. Later, the establishment of Fort Reno provided another market and reposition location. The herds then continued north along the military road until it rejoined the main trail near the Red Fork Ranch just across the Cimarron River some 30 miles further north.

Its name was changed to Eagletown December 16, 1892. Rev. Cyrus Byington established Stockbridge Mission east of the river

in 1835, and there produced the monumental Choctaw grammar and dictionary, giving Choctaws written language. Lyanubbi Female Seminary near Stockbridge was operated from 1843-61. Present town was platted in 1921 by Dierks brothers.

For more than sixty years Friendship schools meet the education needs and were the heart of the Friendship community.

In 1899, soon after old Greer County was declared to be a part of Oklahoma Territory and opened for homesteading. Clabber Flat opened and later was called Friendship by some because the school was the original home of the Friendship Baptist Church.

In 1920 Clabber Flat (Friendship) School District consolidated with Navajoe and part of Lone Oak and Riverside school districts. A new school was built to serve the new consolidated district and was called Friendship.

In 1935 Pleasant Point consolidated with Friendship, while a new school was being built some students attended classes at the Methodist and Baptist Churches.

In 1937 the last Friendship school was built as a WPA project. In 1947 a part of the Ozark District and later, in 1958, the Headrick District joined the Friendship school District.

On November 1, 1962, the Friendship School burned and the school year was completed in the abandoned Humphreys School building. In August 1963, Friendship consolidated with Warren School District and formed the school now known as Navajoe School.

Fort Gibson's history begins in 1824. Colonel Matthew Arbuckle established the fort on the eastern bank of the Grand River, just before the confluence with the Arkansas River. The original fortification included a stockade, with living and operational quarters built along the walls. The fort was positioned to control Indian problems within the area, particularly with the Osage. This fort was situated 80 miles west of the original Fort Smith, so as to replace it, because of the ever expanding boundary of the wilderness. In the 1830's, the fort was met with a new mission: the terminus of the "Trail of Tears." The forced removal of tribes from the east, required Federal troops to enforce the peace and provided supplies to the Cherokee, Creek, Choctaw, Seminole and Chickasaw Indian tribes. As originally constructed, the intention of the fort was to accommodate four companies, but through the 1830's and 40's, increased need sparked a building necessity to house an entire regiment. Also, the post was constructed on low lands, subject to frequent flooding. The new buildings of the post were planned to be constructed on a hill overlooking the stockade, however by 1857, only one stone building had been constructed. That same year, the Cherokees requested that the operations of the fort be moved, and the Army evacuated allowing for Cherokee possession of the fort. As the Civil War broke out in 1861, Confederate forces from Texas and the Indian tribes utilized the fort. Many Indians still felt anguish over the forced relocation from the east. It was a natural fit for many of the Indians to join the Confederacy, as they promised to grant the tribes an independent state. Many (but not all) Indians in the territory picked up arms against the United States.

In the autumn of 1862, Colonel William A. Phillips, challenged the Confederate authority in the Indian Territory. Surging forward into the Indian Territory, this was the first attempt of the Union to regain control of the region.

Confederate troops getting word of an impending attack on Fort Gibson, abandoned the fort. This allowed Federal troops to take Fort Gibson without force. As spring of 1863 arrived, Colonel Phillips received word of Confederate plans in the area. First, Confederate troops under the command of Brigadier General William L. Cabell from Fort Smith, Arkansas, were on the move to join the troops at Honey Springs Depot. Second, Confederate troops wanted to drive the Federal troops away from Indian Territory. That meant expelling the troops at Fort Gibson. Third, the combined force from Arkansas and at Honey Springs would join and take on the Federal forces in the area. Rather than allow this, Colonel Phillips made the decision to go on the offensive, and attack Honey Springs. In July, General Blunt, now reinforced by troops from Kansas and Colorado went on the attack. General Blunt's troops had the best equipment, well armed, good uniforms, and generally had good rations, as they were supplied from Fort Scott. His troops numbered about 3000 and were now emboldened by word of victories at both Gettysburg and Vicksburg. In comparison, the troops under the command of General Douglas, were poorly armed and ill equipped.

The battle of Honey Springs commenced on July 17, 1863. The battlefield was a densely wooded area, split by the Texas Road. Splitting the forces from each other was a deep creek, with a single bridge crossed the creek. The Union forces decidedly took victory in the battle, dispersing the Confederate forces from the field, allowing the depot to be burned to the ground.

This was the single largest battle in Indian Territory, and determined the future for the area. With all major Confederate troops dispersed from the northern portion of Indian Territory, Union forces could now focus their attention on northwest Arkansas, and particularly Fort Smith.

Only one other engagement would endanger Union troops. The Second Battle at Cabin Creek, with troops under the command of Brigadier General Stand Watie overtook a supply train worth \$1.5 million. The supplies were enroute to Fort Gibson, however, the supplies were soon replaced and this battle had little impact to operations. By 1863, Union forces ran off Confederate troops, making Fort Gibson a center of operations for region. A few battles occurred because of the fort. Two battles at Cabin Creek were fought, as the Confederate troops attempted to capture valuable supplies going to the fort. The first battle on July 1 and 2, 1863, was a failure for the Confederates, as half the forces were delayed to get to the fort because of flooded rivers. The Second Battle of Honey Springs was a Confederate victory, as a wagon train bringing over \$1.5 Million worth of supplies was seized on September 19, 1864.

Federal troops maintained a presence at Fort Gibson throughout the century. Between 1866 and 1890 seven large stone buildings and ten frame buildings were constructed for the fort. The fort continued to provide a precences right up until after the land run in 1890, when plans were made to move all troops to Fort Sill.

In 1936, the State of Oklahoma with a grant from the Works Progress Administration, completed a reconstruction of the original stockade, and a number of log buildings just outside the stockade. Details from original plans kept the reconstruction true to the original, with the exception of using better materials, such as pine wood and lime chinking.

In 1874, the cattle ranchers of the San Antonio, Texas area began blazing a trail with their large herds of Longhorn cattle through Western Indian Territory to the railhead at Dodge City, Kansas and to markets beyond into Canada and the Northwest Territories of America. It's estimated that over 11,000,000 head of Longhorns passed over this trail on which you now stand. The trail's wake is marked only by a long sequence of depressions worn into the land by the millions of hooves that traveled it. An instance of one of these depressions is visible just to the back of this marker as a long "U" shaped notch running through the rounded sandy ridge. The Cherokee Strip (located just over one mile north) opened to homesteading in 1893. Imposing that barrier, meant the end of the cattle drives.

thrived until 1912 when a tornado destroyed a significant number of homes and business. The town continued to exist until 1941 when the W.C. Austin Dam was completed for the Lugert~Altus Irrigation District and water soon covered the town site. The town of Lugert was located 1 1/4 miles southeast of this point.

Each cannon was accompanied by one limber plus one caisson drawn by a second team of six horses. The caisson consisted of one limber and one caisson carrying a total of three additional limber chests of ammunition. Each chest held 50 rounds for a 6lb gun or 32 for a 12lb gun. Each caisson also carried a spare wheel, a spare limber pole, pick axes, a felling axe and shovel. When loaded with ammunition, the caisson weighed over 3,800 lbs.

The Plains Indians, Kiowa and Comanche, not only took captives from other tribes, but from Mexicans and whites, as well. Some were cruelly tortured and killed. Others were kept as slaves, though many of them were adopted by Indian families and were loved and pampered as favorites.

One story, from the Kiowa, is the story of Millie Durkin/Durgan, who was taken in a raid when very young.

The life story of Millie Durgan, who later became Mrs. Goombi when she married a Kiowa by that name, is quite unusual, in that she spent all her life, but the first year and half with the Kiowa, her captors. When she was 18 months old she was captured in a raid by the Kiowa, along with a sister and several Negro slaves, and taken north to the area that is now Oklahoma.

Early Indian agents and Army officers persuaded and bribed the tribes to give up these captives and in some instances worked for years to trace their families. Some of the captives had become so thoroughly "Indian" they refused to return to their own people.

Indian foster families were very reluctant to give up their adopted captives and concealed them whenever they could. The most outstanding case of concealment is a part of the history of Kiowa County, OK and the Kiowa People.

landowners. One man claimed he went to bed in Oklahoma and awoke in Texas.

Not every State Capitol has an oil derrick steps away from the front door. In Oklahoma, not only do they, the state government generates revenue from the oil field underneath the Capitol building.

Oklahoma City Oil and Gas Field discovery well brought in December 4, 1928, approximately six miles southeast of this marker.

From such beginnings, sprawling Oklahoma City Oil and Gas Field became one of world's major oil producing areas ranking eighth in nation during first forty years of existence. In this time field yielded 733,543,000 barrels of oil.

Discovery and development of Oklahoma City Oil Field added great stability to economy of both Oklahoma City and State of Oklahoma – providing financial incentive for cultural and industrial progress.

In tapping prolific Wilcox Producing Zone March 25, 1930, Mary Sudik No. 1 well blew “wild” for more than 11 days thereby distinguishing itself as “most publicized oil well in the world.” Rapid development of field, and problems created thereby sparked passage of first comprehensive state legislation for conservation of oil and gas, thus providing model statutes for other states to follow.

To reach oil reserves underlying Oklahoma State Capitol Building, one well was slant drilled from across street to oil sands beneath Capitol.

Discovery well and Wild Mary Sudik were both drilled by Indian Territory Illuminating Oil Company, an affiliate of Cities Service Oil Company and by Foster Petroleum Company.

Oklahoma's rise to prominence as a leading producer of oil, natural gas and refined products can be attributed in great measure to the determination and hardy spirit of its pioneers in the industry. These were the wildcatters, the roughnecks, drillers, pipe liners. the operators of primitive processing plants and those who provided the risk capital. As the industry evolved these oil pioneers were joined by innovators, geologists, engineers, scientists and management people. Through successes and frequent failures there developed the sciences. the technologies processes and conservation approaches that earned for Oklahoma the title "The State That Oil Built". These developments showed the way to economic benefits for all of Oklahoma and influenced technological progress in our nation and the world. As result of these pioneering efforts Oklahoma was ranked as fourth largest crude oil producing state and was the third in natural gas production in 1976 the Bicentennial year of our nation.

Quanah Parker, the last Comanche Chief, was born in Elk Creek just below the Washita Mountains circa 1850.

Quanah, the son of Pitih Norony and Cynitha Ann Parker who was captured by the Comanches, became a fierce warrior and skillfully defended Comancheria against all invaders.

Col. Ronald McKenzie pursued Quanah for years but never captured or defeated him. The destruction of the buffalo forced Quanah to lead the Comanche down this trail to Fort Sill in June 1878

A born leader Quanah bridged the great gap between the old worlds as a War Chief to the new life as a Civil Chief without losing his Comanche identity. A prominent and influential figure he made numerous politic and economic issues.

In 1889 he built Star House a ten room two story house ten mile NE of this sight for his wife, children and anyone who was seeking help.

Quanah was buried in 1911 at Post Oak Mission seven miles NE and reburied 1957 in Fort Sill.

The spirit of Quanah Parker the Eagle of the Comanches welcomes you to his scared home the Washita Mountains.

Karen Silkwood died on November 13, 1974 in a fatal one-car crash. Since then, her story has achieved worldwide fame as the subject of many books, magazine and newspaper articles, and even a major motion picture. Silkwood was a chemical technician at the Kerr-McGee's plutonium fuels production plant in Crescent, Oklahoma, and a member of the Oil, Chemical, and Atomic Workers' Union. She was also an activist who was critical of plant safety. During the week prior to her death, Silkwood was reportedly gathering evidence for the Union to support her claim that Kerr-McGee was negligent in maintaining plant safety, and at the same time, was involved in a number of unexplained exposures to plutonium. The circumstances of her death have been the subject of great speculation.

After her death, organs from Silkwood's body were analyzed as part of the Los Alamos Tissue Analysis Program at the request of the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) and the Oklahoma City Medical Examiner. Silkwood's case was important to the program because it was one of very few cases involving recent exposure to plutonium. It also served to confirm the contemporary techniques for the measurement of plutonium body burdens and lung burdens.
